


Defensive Team Play – Part I Protecting the Middle of the Ice and Tracking


Defensive Side of the Game

Defensively, protect the middle of the ice from our "home base" and out.



Tracking Closing the Gap from Behind "Take Away Time and Space of the Puck Carrier"


Forwards must track back hard and fast to close the gap from behind. This prevents their players from crossing and provides our defensemen with confidence to stand up.




- F3 tracks back hard through the middle and pressures from behind pushes the puck carrier hard from the back side to blue line and chases down chips
- F1 and F2 come back hard through the dots to home base do not get outside the dots
- Outnumber the opposition at our blueline

Tracker - backchecking forward


- Tracking is extension of reload on the forecheck in an effort to be middle ice strong
- Track puck carrier hard
- Track puck carrier through middle ice to outside the dots
- Trackers must push hard to the red line then start to fold to the middle while reading the offensive attack. There must be strong communication between the defense and trackers
- As puck side defenseman receives puck carrier outside the dot, before or at our blueline, tracker must protect middle ice and retrieve loose and chipped pucks
- Tracker will usually be first forward back (F1) to work low in the defensive end





Defensive Zone Coverage

Back hard – Protect Home Base



- Outnumber opposition by the defensive blue line and in the area that we want to defend – Home Base
- Forwards must read role as entering offensive zone
- All F's race back between the dots to defensive zone coverage
- When into position STOP no fly bys!!
 - When things get hectic: **Hold the Slot**

Designating Low Support Forward Options:

- First forward back becomes and stays F1
- Centre is designated low support forward.

Note: many times a winger will be the F1 roles - If playing centre low, a winger, maybe F1 initially, must pick up F2 or F3 responsibilities and switch on first opportunity
